Q1. Read the extract given below and answer the questions that follow:

It was a summer evening, Old Kaspar's work was done, And he before his cottage door Was sitting in the sun, And by him sported on the green His little grandchild Wilhelmine.

- a) Identify the poet and the poem.
- b) What happened on the summer evening as narrated by the poet?
- c) What conversations did Old Kaspar have with his grandchildren? What is the significance of the conversation?
- d) Where was Old Kaspar sitting? Why was he sitting there?
- e) What does the poet mean by 'sported on the green'? Who sported on the green?

Q2. Read the extract given below and answer the questions that follow:

Old Kaspar took it from the boy, Who stood expectant by; And then the old man shook his head, And, with a natural sigh, "Tis some poor fellow's skull," said he, "Who fell in the great victory.

- a) Who is the boy? What did Old Kaspar take from him? Where did he find it?
- b) The boy stood 'expectant by'. What does it mean and show?
- c) What do you understand from the shaking of head of the old man? Why did he sigh?
- d) Which 'Great Victory' is referred in the last lines? Who were involved in this great victory?
- e) Do you think it is a 'great victory'? Why so?

Q3. Read the extract given below and answer the questions that follow:

'Now tell us what 'twas all about,' Young Peterkin, he cries; And little Wilhelmine looks up With wonder-waiting eyes; 'Now tell us all about the war, And what they fought each other for.'

- a) Which topic is being discussed in the extract? Who were Peterkin and Wilhelmine?
- b) Whom was Peterkin questioning? What did he ask?
- c) What is meant by 'wonder-waiting eyes'? Why did Welhelmine look up with such eyes?
- d) Who fought the battle? Was Peterkin given a satisfactory answer? Why?
- e) What does the reply show about a common man's attitude towards war?

Q4. Read the extract given below and answer the questions that follow:

'With fire and sword the country round Was wasted far and wide, And many a childing mother then, And new-born baby died; But things like that, you know, must be At every famous victory.

- a) Which country is referred to in the extract? What is meant by 'Was wasted far and wide'?
- b) What did the speaker say about the effects of the battle on his own family?
- c) What is meant by a 'childing mother'? Why do you think the poet specifically points out that "many a childing mothernew-born baby died"?
- d) What do the last two lines in the extract tell about the attitude of the speaker towards the events that he is narrating? What are your feelings for the speaker?
- e) By referring to the incidents in the poem, state how 'After Blenheim' can be said to be an anti-war poem.

Q5. Read the extract given below and answer the questions that follow:

"Great praise the Duke of Marlbro' won, And our good Prince Eugene." "Why, 'twas a very wicked thing!" Said little Wilhelmine. "Nay...nay...my little girl," quoth he, 'It was a famous victory.

- a) Who are the Duke of Marlbro' and Prince Eugene?
- b) What makes the speaker praise these people? Do you think they are praiseworthy?
- c) What does Wilhelmine think to be 'wicked'? Why does she think so? Do you agree with her?
- d) What answer does Old Kaspar give to Wilhelmine? Why does he say so?
- e) Whose victory was it? What was the cost of the victory?
